Dear Daniel:

Ohio is in the midst of an unprecedented public health crisis. At least fourteen Ohioans are dying every single day from drug overdoses. In addition to the sheer horror of lost lives, the state of Ohio and its people face a nearly unending barrage of costs associated with treatment, prevention, enforcement, rehabilitation, and lost opportunity. It's time for the industry that caused this epidemic to make things right.

I have noticed with great interest the public comments made by many of the pain pill manufacturers that they recognize the seriousness of the opioid epidemic and express a desire to be part of the solution. I want to see if the industry is really serious about developing and contributing to an appropriate and sufficient response. In that regard I am presenting each company an opportunity to meet with me and my office within the next 30 days to begin building a response that will immediately start saving lives and preventing future deaths and suffering.

This is indeed an emergency, but it is one that requires positive action rather than carefully drafted promises to act at some indefinite time in the future. I am giving your client the opportunity to come to my office to discuss steps it is willing to take to address the harm its products and messaging have caused. I expect this to be a substantive meeting with real terms, real plans, and real money behind it. It needs to include education for prescribers, prevention for school children, resources for treatment, repayment to consumers and the state for money spent on inappropriately prescribed drugs and the medications and counseling needed to address the resulting addiction.

There is no denying that the rise in opioid abuse that has stricken our communities increased in tandem with the prescribing of opioids. There is also no denying that your client was a direct beneficiary of that increase. What remains to be seen is their
