

Narrative:

On April 3, 2023, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agent (SA) Nick Valente (Valente) and SA Joe Goudy (Goudy) interviewed Brookfield Township Police Department (BTPD) Sergeant Sergeant was accompanied by his attorney, George Gerken of the Ohio Patrolman's Benevolent Association. The interview took place at the Brookfield Township Administration Building and was audio and video recorded. The audio recording has been attached to this report. The video recording has been stored in the BCI SIU case file as Reference Item I.

Prior to beginning the interview, Sergeant read, indicated he understood, and signed the BCI Criminal Investigation Notification Form. That form has been attached to this report.

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Officer Involved Critical Incident - 1433 State Route 7, Brookfield Township, Ohio 44403, Trumbull County

Narrative:

SA Valente asked Sergeant if he reviewed his body-worn camera (BWC) video before providing his statement to BCI. Sergeant said he had not watched his body-worn camera. When asked if he had watched any body-worn camera recordings from the incident, Sergeant stated "Um, that, that night I briefly saw portions of I think it was a trooper's from across the room on a laptop, but actually sit down and review it, no" [17:05 mark of video]. When asked if he knew what trooper's video he watched Sergeant stated he did not know, he only observed approximately 10 seconds of the video and just happened to be in the room when others were viewing the video.
SA Valente asked Sergeant to provide details about the shooting he was involved in on March 21, 2023. Sergeant reported the following:
Sergeant stated that prior to reporting for duty on the midnight shift in which the incident occurred, he came to work earlier in the day for an in-service training. While at the in-service training, members of the BTPD became aware of a vehicle pursuit that started in Lordstown, Ohio. The subject of that pursuit abandoned their vehicle and fled on foot in Brookfield Township. The Chief of the BTPD came into the in-service training and asked the officers if they would like to stop the training and assist in looking for the subject who had been involved in the pursuit. The BTPD officers at the training, including Sergeant agreed to stop the in-service training and assist in attempting to locate the subject from the pursuit. The group of officers from the in-service training were assigned to perimeter positions and similar roles. They assisted for approximately one and a half to two hours before returning to the in-service training. The subject was not located or apprehended at the time they assisted in the search.
When Sergeant reported to work his normal shift later that evening, which began at 2300 hours, he was told about a vehicle that was stolen from the area where the subject was last seen. Sergeant thought it was likely the person who stole this vehicle was the same person involved in the earlier pursuit. Other officers told Sergeant that their suspect in the stolen vehicle was the same person involved in the earlier pursuit. Sergeant was told the person wanted for the pursuit was Fred Wild (Wild). Sergeant and others went to Wild's father's home to attempt to gather information on where Wild may be. Wild's father told Sergeant he was not close to his son, but the subject did have a friend named Brian who was an animal trapper with a lake on his property and lived on State Route 7.

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Adkins requested that Sergeant give him time to return to his home before the officers arrived to search for the subject and that they not share with the subject that Adkins told them where he was. Sergeant stated that was fine and Adkins left the meeting to return to his house.
Sergeant requested assistance from other nearby law enforcement agencies to assist in the search for the subject. In total, Sergeant and BTPD Officer Ellwood-Bellas received assistance from two Trumbull County Sheriff's deputies, four Ohio State Highway Patrol Troopers, two Vienna Township police officers, and one Lordstown police officer. Collectively, eleven law enforcement officers from five different agencies gathered and participated in the attempt to apprehend the subject.
The eleven law enforcement officers all met down the street from Adkins' property where Sergeant and Adkins had met. Sergeant briefed the group on the subject and informed them the subject was the individual wanted for the pursuit described above. Sergeant showed the group a map and relayed the information he obtained from Adkins including a description of the property and cabin. Sergeant stated "so we kind of formulated a little, utilike a plan to go down there. We all had to park by the road. So, we're all going to have to walk down there, its back in the woods. I don't know how far it is, $1/8^{th}$ of a mile or whatever maybe. And, uh, so basically, we came up with a plan. We were gonna do, um two people on the north side of the cabin, two people on the east, two people on the west, and then three people on the south. The third, um, was because the Lordstown guy brought a thermal camera with him and that's where the front door was obviously" [28:36 mark of video]. The remaining two officers were to wait at the roadway and once all the officers on foot were in position the two officers with vehicles would drive down the driveway, turn on their vehicle's scene lights, and call out the subject using a PA system.
Sergeant could not recall which specific law enforcement officers were assigned to each location and role but did recall that Deputy the Lordstown officer, and himself were all assigned to the side of the building where the door was.
Sergeant descried the group walking down the driveway together with the Lordstown officer in the lead position. When the group got closer to the cabin they saw a light coming from the cabin and could also hear music. Sergeant believed the music was coming from the truck. The truck was parked directly next to the cabin and facing him, with the driver window of the truck down and directly lined up with the window of the cabin. The truck was blocking the door to the cabin. Sergeant saw the subject in the cabin through the window. 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relayed this to the next officer behind/near him who continued to relay the information down the line to the other law enforcement personnel. Sergeant further described the truck parked next to the cabin as older, blue and grey in color, and having a snow plow attached. Sergeant quickly surmised this was the truck that was stolen earlier in the day as it matched the description of the stolen truck. Sergeant knew that the Lordstown officer and Deputy were near him on the side of the cabin with the door when the remaining personnel on foot began to walk through the woods to surround the cabin. When the other personnel began walking into the woods "somebody stepped on a stick, branch, board, something in that area and it cracked real loud" [33:24 mark of video]. Sergeant then observed the subject look out the window, stand up, look out the window and put his face right up to the glass of the window. Sergeant then used the flashlight on his rifle to illuminate the subject and ordered him to "show us his hands" [34:11 mark of video]. The subject then flung open the window of the cabin aligned with the driver door window of the truck and dove into the truck. Sergeant then walked in front of the truck with the intent to grab the subject before he could fully get into the truck from the hunting cabin. As Sergeant began to walk in front of the truck he realized he would not be able to get between the truck and hunting cabin and began backing up to his original position. Sergeant stated "So he starts, I think the truck started when I was still, I don't remember when it started. I was either in front or I had moved, but I basically aborted that plan. I said I'm getting out of the way 'cause he's gonna try and leave. So, I stepped back to the passenger side. Um, were still yelling 'show us your hands.' I could hear somebody beating on the passenger window of the truck" [34:59 mark of video]. Sergeant continued, "So the truck fires up and it starts moving as soon as it starts. Um and when he went forward I remember he hit a little like a tree that was there and ran it right over. I stepped out of the way" [35:35 mark of video]. "My first thought was I'm getting out of the way of this thing and I focused on him and just assumed were going to have to run down this driveway and its going to start a pursuit with these guys waiting. You know, obviously, pretty quickly, uh, I heard

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a gunshot and as soon as I heard that first shot that's when I kinda like realized, took my

attention off of me being, you know, out of the way and realized there' still people in the way. Um, at some point in there I fired my weapon, when I was, yeah, I want to say I was standing close to, I don't know, close to where that dirt is basically the corner of those woods" [36:07]

mark of video].

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stated when he fired his weapon the line or travel for his bullet(s) would have begun at the back-right corner of the vehicle and gone diagonal to the front left of the vehicle. Sergeant described the truck as having stopped pretty quickly. Sergeant then ran up to the passenger window and looked in while giving orders and felt "it was pretty clear he was probably deceased" [37:13 mark of video]. Sergeant then broke the passenger window of the vehicle to gain entry as the door was locked. Once he broke the window, Sergeant looked inside, assumed the subject was deceased, then reached inside the truck, smacked the shifter into park, and turned off the truck. After checking to see if anyone (besides the subject) was injured Sergeant called for EMS to respond. Sergeant then met with EMS personnel along the driveway and escorted them to the truck. EMS personnel confirmed the subject was deceased. Sergeant then escorted EMS personnel out of the scene. Around this same time a trooper suggested all of the involved parties who fired a weapon place those weapons in his vehicle. Sergeant placed his rifle in the trooper's vehicle along with the other involved parties that fired their weapons. Sergeant then contacted the BTPD chief and detective. Sergeant then waited at the end of the driveway for his chief and the detective to arrive. After relaying the above account of events, Sergeant stated he wanted to point out that he knew but failed to mention earlier that he was aware of the subject having a second outstanding warrant for his arrest for an unknown crime out of a county he could not recall, but did recall the entering agency confirmed they did want the subject prior to the officers approaching the cabin. When asked, Sergeant stated he did learn earlier in the day the subject may be in possession of a musket as he was reported to have one at that time. When asked, Sergeant stated that he heard at least one gunshot before firing his weapon. When asked what he presumed was happening when he heard the first gunshot, Sergeant stated "that's what alerted me to like, you know, oh shit, there's people standing in front of that. Like I got out of the way but they did not. Um, so, my thing was, he started moving. Once he started moving, went right over that little tree with that plow, that's when I perceived a threat

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towards, not me but the people that were still out in front of the truck. It was pretty clear that the

guy intended to get away" [48:46 mark of video].

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When asked how many times he thought he fired, Sergeant stated "I know once, at lea(st), I don't think any more than two, one or two. Best guess is one [50:34 mark of video].

Sergeant estimated the amount of time between him hearing the first gunshot and firing himself to be approximately two seconds.

When asked what his concerns were regarding what could have happened when the truck began to accelerate and he fired his weapon, Sergeant stated "That's when, I didn't perceive a threat against me but I perceived a threat against the people that were still in front so I thought he was gonna run somebody over [52:01 mark of video].

When asked if he could see the locations of all the other officers from his vantage point (at the time he fired), Sergeant stated "I don't think I could see all, I mean there's no way I could recall and tell you where everybody was" [54:44 mark of video].

Sergeant did not know who fired first but stated he knew it came from the area in front of the truck.

Sergeant did not believe he has had any previous interactions with the subject.

Sergeant stated he believed his actions and that of the other law enforcement personnel were consistent with his training.

Note that at no point in the interview did Sergeant make reference to his magazine becoming unseated from his rifle.


