Investigative Request

On Friday, April 19, 2024, Whitehall Police Department (WPD) requested the assistance of the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation's (BCI) Special Investigations Unit (SIU) and Crime Scene Unit (CSU) in conducting an independent investigation into the facts and circumstances surrounding an officer-involved shooting incident. The incident was reported to be between Santiago Elias Alfaromunoz (Alfaromunoz) and WPD officers that occurred in a parking lot near 4632 East Main Street, Whitehall (Roses Discount Store Parking lot/McDonalds Parking lot). Alfaromunoz was transported to Mount Caramel East Hospital where he succumbed to his injuries. The driver of the vehicle was later identified as William Villatoro (Villatoro). WPD will be handling all investigative activities and charges regarding Villatoro.

Preface:

This report serves as a synopsis of the investigation into the April 19, 2024, officer-involved shooting in Franklin County, Ohio. This report only summarizes the information that the investigative team determined to be the most useful in achieving an overall understanding of what occurred in this incident. Every fact and detail is not presented in this summary report. Therefore, it is recommended that each individual report from which this document is derived be read in order to obtain a complete understanding of this investigation. Further, audio and/or video recordings exist for the majority of the interviews conducted, revealing further details of statements given regarding the incident.

This investigation was conducted with the purpose of determining, to the extent possible, the facts and circumstances surrounding this incident. As unbiased collectors of fact, the investigative team has not and will not render any opinion of the legality of

Summary of Process

- Recorded interview(s) of the involved subject, William Villatoro, directly involved in the incident
- Interviews of Travon Black, Giovanni Escobar, civilian witnesses to the incident
- Interviews of family members or associates of the decedent
- Obtained and reviewed postmortem examination (autopsy) and toxicology reports

- Review of all available dash cameras involved in the incident
- Review of all available body cameras involved in the incident
- Processing of the scene for potential evidence (photographing, searching, measuring, documenting, and collecting)
- 3D scans / model of incident area
- Processing of involved vehicle(s) for potential evidence
- Reviewed audio communications on the radio frequencies utilized during the incident

Incident Summary/Overview

On Friday, April 19, 2024 at approximately 0330 hours, the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) was requested by Chief Mike Crispen of the Whitehall Police

Department (WPD) to conduct an independent investigation of the facts and circumstances surrounding an officer-involved shooting which occurred in the area of 4632 East Main Street, Whitehall, Ohio. BCI Special Agent Chad Holcomb (SA Holcomb) responded to assist, arriving at approximately 0400 hours. Also responding from the BCI Special Investigations Unit were Special Agents Matt Collins, Kyle Douglass and Acting Special Agent Supervisor Jim Mulford. Additionally, the BCI Crime Scene Unit was requested to process the scene by documenting and collecting pertinent evidence.

The shooting incident involved a subject, Santiago Alfaromunoz, William Villatoro, and members of the Whitehall Police Department. The incident resulted in the death of Alfaromunoz.

On scene, WPD Deputy Chief Chad Wilder briefed agents. Dep. Chief Wilder stated that officers were advised that shot spotter received an alert of gunfire around 4632 East Main Street. Upon officers' arrival, they located a vehicle containing William Villatoro (driver) and Santiago Alfaromunoz (passenger) parked near the McDonalds parking lot.

Both officers retreated backwards towards cover, where they waited for back up to arrive and called for a medic. When a few more officers arrived, they approached the vehicle and found Alfaromunoz with a gunshot wound to the head. Alfaromunoz was transported to the hospital by medics where he ultimately succumbed to his injuries.

WPD investigated the possession of firearm in the motor vehicle and charged Villatoro on April 19, 2024 with possession/concealing of a firearm.





 While placing Villatoro in handcuffs, Alfaromunoz can be seen reaching for something over his left shoulder in the back seat.





During the BWC review it was found that Alfaromunoz and Villatoro were speaking Spanish to each other in front of the officers during the encounter. SA Poole sent a clip of that encounter to Sergeant Guillermo Zarate (Sgt.. Zarate) of the Capital University Police for translation. *Please review the full BWC report for more details*.

Sgt. Zarate translated the communication which identified Alfaromunoz stating, "I put it in the back behind." And "run away."

Villatoro stated: "He saw the tool." (Tool= Also used as slang for a gun)

Sgt. Zarate stated he could clearly hear and understand the officer's commands in Spanish throughout the encounter.



Post-Mortem Examination / Autopsy Report

The autopsy report for the decedent (Santiago Elias Alfaromunoz) was obtained from the Franklin County Coroner's Office. A review of those documents revealed the following information:

Physical Evidence and Laboratory Reports

Various items of potential evidence were submitted to the BCI Laboratory for analysis. The actual reports should be consulted as the following synopsis does not include many of the details from the full reports.

The BCI Firearms Section performed an analysis of the officers' firearms, as well as the firearm-related evidence collected from the scene, vehicles, and autopsies (casings and bullets). By comparing evidentiary cartridge casings/projectiles to known standards from each weapon, identifications were able to be made as to which casings/projectiles were fired from each firearm. Of the casings/projectiles recovered, the following identifications were made:

Item 6: Glock Model 19Gen5 (1) 9mm cartridges in Item 4. This item	was operable and was source identified to one was used by Whitehall
Item 7: Glock Model 19Gen5 9mm cartridges in Items 1,2,3,5. This is	was operable and source identified to four (4) tem was used by Whitehall

Item 9: Taurus Model G3 (ACC691483) was operable. This item was found behind the center console on the floor of the vehicle loaded with 14 rounds in the magazine.

Investigative Interviews

The following information comprises extremely abbreviated versions of the statements made by the witness and/or participants of this incident deemed by the author to be of most relevance to the overall understanding of the incident. More detailed accounts can be found by reading the separate reports written by the interviewers and by reviewing the recordings of each interview, including those not synopsized below.

WPD Officer Bruce Stephen Interview

When Ofc. Stephen got to the scene; he saw wall as cover. Deputy Chief Chad Wilder (DC Wilder) and were behind a cruiser. DC Wilder got a ballistic shield from his vehicle and Ofc. Stephen retrieved his long gun. At the time, he was only aware that discharged his firearm. Officers approached the subject's vehicle from the rear passenger side of the vehicle. He saw a male, later identified as Santiago Alfaromunoz (Alfaromunoz), sitting in the front passenger seat unresponsive. A medical bag was retrieved and Ofc. Stephens began to render aid to Alfaromunoz. Ofc. Stephen observed a gunshot wound to Alfaromunoz's head. Ofc. Stephen attempted to protect Alfaromunoz's airway and breathing. There was no profuse or active bleeding anywhere else that he observed.

Deputy Chief Chad Wilder Interview

DC Wilder stated that he was at the intersection of Hamilton & Main Street and preparing to go home for the evening. While he was sitting there, he heard state he heard gunshots. DC Wilder responded to the location where the gunshots were heard.

As DC Wilder was heading towards the direction of the gunshots, dispatch aired that ShotSpotter tracked the location to the area of Roses Department Store. As DC Wilder entered the shopping center he stated there wasn't much going on. He saw a semi-truck and two vehicles parked side-by-side which would contain the subjects that officers interacted with. One vehicle was dark and the other one was a lighter color vehicle which had its flashers on.

DC Wilder continued westbound and northbound through the parking lot. DC Wilder saw two WPD cruisers pull into the parking lot and state they were going to talk to the vehicle with its flashers on. The darker vehicle then proceeded to leave the area.

DC Wilder then heard say on the radio that they had two people in the vehicle and there was a '33' [firearm] in the vehicle. DC Wilder then began to head

back to the officers and the subject's vehicle. DC Wilder was approximately a few hundred yards away from the scene but couldn't see them. As he was driving towards the scene, rounding the corner where he could see the scene, he saw on the passenger side of the subject's vehicle.

DC Wilder continued to drive towards the scene and heard approximately 4-8 gunshots. He did not see anyone shooting. He then aired "shots fired, 10-3" [officer in trouble] and kept driving towards the scene. As he was approaching the scene, he saw in a "shooting position" with his arms locked out and back-peddling rapidly.

DC Wilder tl	hen parked his car and observed a person in the ${\scriptscriptstyle \parallel}$	passenger seat and heard

moving. DC	Wilder asked for medics to respond and asked	if the male was
struck;	responded that he wasn't sure.	

All officers then backed away from the vehicle and took cover behind a WPD vehicle. DC Wilder then got a ballistic shield from the trunk of his vehicle. A team consisting of Ofc. Grace, Ofc. Stephens, and DC Wilder then approached the vehicle on the passenger side. They determined that there wasn't an immediate threat, medical attention was then provided to the male, later identified as Santiago Alfaromunoz (Alfaromunoz).

DC Wilder stated that Alfaromunoz was still breathing at this time. A medical bag was then obtained and Ofc. Stephens, who has advanced medical training, performed medical aid to Alfaromunoz. Alfaromunoz was removed from the vehicle by the medics who arrived "fairly quickly". After the male was removed from the vehicle, DC Widler then set up a crime scene perimeter and called for additional resources.

WPD Interview

stated, "Immediately before this incident, I went to assist at a traffic stop on Hamilton Road. During the stop, we heard gunshots that sounded like they were in close proximity. Radio aired that ShotSpotter had indicated two (2) gunshots in the area of Roses Discount Store which was less than a half a mile from our location.

I got into my cruiser and drove north on Hamilton Road and turned right (east) onto E. Main Street. I turned left (north) just east of the McDonald's and drove north down the east side of the McDonald's. There was a silver SUV with its hazard lights blinking in the parking lot. It was parked northwest of the McDonald's, with the front of the SUV facing west. I pulled behind the SUV and put my cruiser into park. It was dark outside

but there was some light from the parking lot lights, as well as the lights around the McDonalds. As I was exiting my cruiser, I noticed that the interior dome light was illuminated and I saw movement in the front seat of the SUV.

I approached the driver's side of the SUV. I had my flashlight in my left hand and used it to illuminate the interior of the car as I approached. There was a lot of stuff in the backseat of the car, including clothes, bags and a 12-pack of beer. The driver was a Hispanic male and he was turned around (to his left), lifted up out of the driver's seat and looking at me over the back of the seat. Once I reached the vehicle, he sat down and used his hands to pull down the driver's side window. He pulled the window about halfway down and I asked if he spoke English and he replied no. arrived and approached the passenger. He asked if there were any pistols in the car and the passenger responded no. I used my flashlight to take another look through window and into the backseat of the car and I saw the grip of handgun against the back of the center console. I think the barrel of the handgun was concealed by a bag or something but I was certain there was a gun. I told that there was a "33" which is our 10-code for a gun.

I opened the driver's door and told the driver to get out of the vehicle. The driver exited the vehicle and I told him to turn around. As I was securing him in handcuffs, I asked him "pistola?" He replied no. I heard repeatedly saying "manos arriba!" I saw the suspect moving in the passenger's seat but since I was securing the driver, I could not see exactly what the passenger was doing. I heard repeat "manos arriba" faster just as I finished handcuffing the driver. Not even half a second later, he said it again with a worried infliction in his voice. Suddenly, I heard a gunshot and I did not see by the passenger door where he had just been standing.

I quickly drew my weapon and I fired my weapon through the back passenger side window at the suspect. I then heard yelling at the suspect to put his hands up. I grabbed the driver, who was kneeling down, and pulled him behind a brick wall (that I believe encloses the McDonald's dumpsters) that was just south of my cruiser. I took a position on the northeast corner of the brick wall and kept my gun pointed at the SUV. Deputy Chief Wilder pulled up with several other officers. He gave instructions to the other officers to secure a shield. I put the driver into the back of a cruiser.

Deputy Chief Wilder and Officers Grace and Stephen advanced towards the suspect's vehicle. I was behind them. Once they got to the vehicle and could see the suspect, Deputy Chief Wilder requested a medical bag. Other officers secured the scene and rendered aid until medics arrived."

stated, "Once I got near the location, I recognized what I believed to be eputy Chief Wilder's (#74) unmarked police car (Jeep Patriot or Compass) in the arking lot of Rose's to the south of its entrance. I radioed to ask if it was him. He firmed it was and that there was a car pointed in my direction (south) with its lights in. I made a U-turn on E Main (west) then entered the Long John Silver's parking lot north) and drove through the parking lot to where the vehicle was parked.	in the im. He h its lights
parked my cruiser facing the vehicle, which was pointed southwest, on the front river's side. My cruiser was facing northeast. So cruiser was directly ehind the vehicle pointed at its rear with its lights on towards the south. When I got ut of my cruiser, had already approached the driver's side door of a ght-colored SUV. There were two occupants inside the vehicle, so I moved towards the assenger side with my flashlight on. As I approached the vehicle, I turned on my body forn camera. The occupants were both Hispanic males in their mid-30s. The passenger as wearing a ball cap and a casual shirt. He was eating chicken nuggets and drinking Budweiser. The window was approximately a third of the way down. The passenger toked familiar, but I could not place him. At this point we had probable cause to search the vehicle due to the open ontainer and the failure to report the gun when directly asked. My plan was to remove occupants from the vehicle so that it could eventually be searched.	("manos e open

responded "huh?" and "what?" to my repeated commands. When he continued to not comply, I pulled my gun out at low ready and backed away slightly from the vehicle so he could see the gun. I told him to "put his fucking hands up" in English. He continued to not comply and faced his body towards the driver's side. The driver had been secured by at this time and had been taken towards the rear driver's side of the vehicle.

I opened the passenger car door with my left hand. The suspect then turned his body with his right arm crossing the front of his body towards the back of the center console of the vehicle where had previously indicated that there was a firearm. I backed away to the north, raising my weapon. I kept ordering the suspect to "manos arriba." Then, the suspect suddenly spun back in my direction with his right elbow slightly bent in a manner I would consider consistent with bringing around a weapon to a target. He continued to turn toward me with his right arm/elbow up. I believed at the time that he was bringing a gun around to shoot at me, though I do not remember seeing a weapon. I fired once while continuing to back away and yelling at him to stop. I remember hearing a scream, which I thought at the time was the suspect. The suspect tensed up and fell back into the car's seat. I did not fire any further as it appeared the suspect had been hit. During this same period of time, I saw/heard who was to my left to the left/rear of the vehicle, shoot twice towards the vehicle. I aired that shots were fired. I kept my gun at the ready and continued to order the suspect to put his hands up.

I could hear sirens. Officer Bruce Stephens and Officer Spencer Grace eventually responded. Deputy Chief Wilder told us to wait for a shield prior to approaching the vehicle. Once we were able to approach with the shield, we ascertained that the suspect was no longer a threat."

Summary

All persons known to have relevant information regarding this investigation have been interviewed (or attempted), and all known pertinent records and evidence have been obtained and reviewed. BCI will continue to offer investigative assistance into any newly identified witnesses or information relative to this criminal investigation. BCI's investigation into this Officer-Involved Critical Incident is concluded unless such new information/witnesses is/are identified through grand jury or other means.

Agents remain available for consultation and/or to perform any additional investigation, analysis, processing and/or other assistance/involvement you might deem to be necessary.
