tion under the control of the state, municipality or school district as the case may be, for a specified period after having served in the legislature or city council or board or education. A statute in this state, Section 12912, General Code, prohibits an officer of a municipal corporation from acting as commissioner, architect, superintendent or engineer in work undertaken or prosecuted by such corporation during the term for which he was elected or appointed or for one year thereafter. There is no similar statute with respect to members of a board of education. I know of no reason why a member of a board of education may not resign and immediately thereafter be employed by the board, of which he formerly had been a member, as a teacher in the public schools under the control of the board, providing he is properly certificated and is employed in the manner provided by the statute.

I am therefore of the opinion in specific answer to your question that, in the event the board member in question resigns, he may lawfully be employed to teach in the public schools of the district and may be designated as principal in the manner provided for by Section 7705, General Code, providing he holds a proper certificate to teach in the grades for which he is employed.
