APPROVAL, FINAL RESOLUTION FOR ROAD IMPROVEMENT, HAN-COCK COUNTY, OHIO.

Dear Sir:—I am in receipt of your letter of April 28, 1921, enclosing for my approval final resolution on the following improvement:

Findlay-Upper Sandusky road, I. C. H. No. 222, Sections H-2 and K, Hancock county.

I have carefully examined said resolution, find it correct in form and legal, and am therefore returning the same to you with my approval endorsed thereon in accordance with section 1218 G. C.

I call your attention to the fact that on the face page of the certified copy of the final resolution the total cost of the work is given as \$117,500 and the state's share as \$92,300; whereas the certificate of your chief clerk shows that the state has appropriated \$97,000. It would thus seem that the certificate of your chief clerk needs correction. However, I am not withholding my approval and am merely calling your attention to the seeming error.
