Investigative Request:

On Tuesday, September 16, 2025, the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) was requested by the Springfield Police Department, to conduct an independent investigation of the facts and circumstances surrounding an Officer-Involved Critical Incident (OICI) that occurred near 513 South Isabella Street in Springfield, Clark County, Ohio, which resulted in the death of Patrick Foley (Foley).

Preface:

This report serves as a synopsis of the investigation into the September 16, 2025, officer-involved critical incident. This report only summarizes the information that the author determined to be the most useful in achieving an overall understanding of what occurred in this incident. Not all facts and details are presented in this summary report. Therefore, it is recommended that each individual report from which this document is derived be read in order to obtain a complete understanding of this investigation. Further, audio and/or video recordings exist for the majority of the interviews conducted, revealing further details of statements given regarding the incident.





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This investigation was conducted with the purpose of determining, to the extent possible, the facts and circumstances surrounding this incident. As unbiased collectors of fact, the investigative team has not and will not render any opinion of the legality of officers' actions. Instead, it is anticipated that this investigation will provide the basis of information for decisions to be rendered by the appropriate authorities.

Investigative Team:

Ohio BCI Special Agent Lauren Frazier was assigned as the Lead Case Agent. BCI Special Agent Steven Seitzman assisted with the investigation. The investigation was supervised by BCI Special Agent Supervisors William Jones and Kevin Barbeau. Additionally, the BCI Crime Scene Unit (CSU) was requested to process the scene, by documenting and collecting pertinent evidence. Crime Scene Special Agent Aja Chung was the Lead Agent for crime scene.

Summary of Investigative Process:

The following is a partial list of investigative activities or methods which were employed during the course of this investigation, in an effort to thoroughly and accurately locate and document all pertinent facts and circumstances regarding this incident:

 Kitchen, all of whom were identified as officers with some level of involvement

- Obtained and reviewed medical records from Miami Valley Hospital, pertaining to injuries and treatment administered
- Interview with the subject's family members to learn about the involved subject
- Obtained and reviewed police reports of prior law enforcement contacts involving the subject
- Obtained and reviewed open and closed-source biographical information on the subject, to include criminal history reports, OHLEG, and driving records
- Special Agent follow up regarding the post-mortem examination (autopsy) of Foley at the Montgomery County Coroner's Office
- Requested the post-mortem examination report, toxicology report, and death certificate, which will be received on a later date
- Review of available and relevant body-worn cameras and cruiser cameras involved in the incident





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- Processing of the scene for potential evidence (photographing, searching, measuring, documenting, and collecting)
- 3D scans/model of the scene taken by the BCI Crime Scene Unit
- Reviewed audio communications on radio frequencies utilized during incident
- Review of dispatch/CAD records pertaining to the incident

Incident Summary/Overview:

The following information is based on the statements of the involved law enforcement officer, witnessing officers, video footage, evidence collected, and dispatch/CAD information.

On September 16, 2025, at approximately 11	34 hours, Springfield Police
attempted to initiate a traffic stop o	n a silver Ford truck for a speeding
violation. The vehicle took off at a high speed	d and fled from the traffic stop.
discontinued the traffic stop and att	tempted to locate the vehicle in the area.
At approximately 1138 hours,	located the silver Ford truck at South
Isabella Street near East Pleasant Street. A Wh	nite male subject, later identified as Patrick
Foley, fled from the vehicle on foot.	began to pursue Foley on foot.
During the brief foot pursuit,	deployed his department-issued Taser,
which incapacitated the subject while he was	running. The Taser was effective and
Foley fell to the ground and sustained injurie	s to his head and face.

Officers immediately called for a medic to respond and began providing medical intervention on the subject. Due to the subject's injuries and medics being located further away, officers decided to transport the subject. The subject was placed in the back of Springfield Police Van 40 and transported to Springfield Regional Medical





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Center (SRMC). The subject was then transported via medical helicopter to Miami Valley Hospital in critical medical condition. On September 19, 2025, Foley was determined to be brain dead and pronounced deceased.

It was later determined that a female passenger had also fled from the vehicle and was identified as Tyvonda Lynn Jones. Reportedly, the female did not observe the OICI involving Foley. Numerous attempts were made to locate Jones but were unsuccessful.

Springfield Police Detective Josh Lish wrote a search warrant for the vehicle involved. It should be noted that alleged narcotics were located on the subject and inside of the vehicle.

Involved-Subject:

Patrick Foley was a 37-year-old adult living in the City of Springfield. His mother is April Foley, and his father is Cecil Foley. April stated that Patrick was an athlete and a good person. She said that in his senior year of high school, he got into a crowd with the wrong people. Since then, Patrick got involved with drugs and had traffic related interactions with the police. April said that Patrick fled from the sheriff's office previously for not having a license and was sentenced to a year at London Correctional Institution. April said that Patrick worked as a tree trimmer and was very good at climbing trees.

April went on to say that the only reason that Patrick would have run from the police was because his license was suspended. April said that the truck that Patrick was driving belonged to him. She said that Patrick bought the truck less than a month ago from a work client. She said that the vehicle was registered in someone else's name because Patrick's license was suspended.

Records showed that Foley did computerized criminal history	. In summary, Foley's

Interview with Family:


On September 22, 2025, investigators spoke with Patrick Foley's parents, Cecil and April Foley. Their attorney Patrick Conboy was present for the interview. The family stated that Patrick's injuries consisted of swelling, facial fractures, skull fractures, and broken heart syndrome. April said that she was told that Patrick hit his head on a rock but could not recall by who. Cecil said that nurses removed several pieces of gravel





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from Patrick's face, during treatment received at the hospital. Cecil took several photographs of Foley (pictured below):

On September 19, 2025, April said that doctors at Miami Valley Hospital performed numerous tests on Patrick to check for brain activity. The tests included a physical exam, brain stem function test, apnea test, and four-vessel nuclear scan. After performing these tests, April and Cecil stated that Patrick was determined to have no brain activity and was pronounced by medical staff as deceased due to being brain dead. April stated that Patrick wished to be an organ donor. Therefore, Patrick's body was placed on life-support, pending organ donation, which took place on September 23, 2025.

Medical Records:

Medical records from Miami Valley Hospital were requested by Patrick's father, Cecil Foley, on September 18, 2025. The medical records were provided to Attorney Patrick Conboy, who voluntarily provided the records to SA Frazier. Additionally, a consent to search form was completed by Cecil Foley and Attorney Conboy during the family interview on September 22, 2025. Below is an extremely condensed version of the medical records received:






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


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collection of items of evidence. Detailed crime scene reports were completed, with the below information only summarizing some of the more significant findings.

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Officer Interviews:

The following interview is the officer's account of his actions pertaining to this incident. A more detailed account can be found by reading the separate report written and by reviewing the audio recording of the interview.

I also previously had worked for the Springfield Police Dept. ave been employed as a sworn law enforcement officer since I graduated from the Clark State Police Academy in
	am currently assigned as a security of the traffic unit on security is a shift . I work throughout the city.
b v	am providing this statement voluntarily. I have prepared the statement to the est of my recollection. I have not yet had the opportunity to review all of the ideos of the incident and it is possible that this review might refresh my ecollection in the future.
o y u	am familiar with the Springfield Police Department's policies and procedures n use of force. My most recent training on use of force occurred within the last ear. I have also attended various in-service trainings. I was first trained on the se of a taser when I started as a law enforcement officer and have had yearly pdates. I most recently completed my updated taser training in August 2025.

On September 16, 2025, I was working I was wearing my unform. I carry my Glock Model 45 9mm pistol along with 3 magazines containing 17 rounds each. One magazine is contained in the firearm, the remaining 2 are carried on my vest. My firearm had 18 rounds (1 in the weapon and 17 in the magazine). I also had with a department issued taser. I carried this on my belt.

I was sitting stationary on South Limestone near Perrin Avenue when I observed a silver F250 pass another car. I checked the speed with laser and clocked his speed at 62 mph in a 35 mph zone. I activated my lights before the vehicle passed me. I was able to get a good look at the driver. I got behind the vehicle. The vehicle did not stop but turned onto a side street. I activated my siren and the suspect vehicle accelerated away from me. I observed the suspect vehicle go through a number of stop signs. I continued the pursuit.





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I reported the vehicle and a description of the driver to dispatch. Per Department policy, I discontinued the pursuit but maintained visual contact with the suspect vehicle. The suspect vehicle drove away from me and I attempted to intercept him a side street. I lost visual contact for a short period of time and continued searching for the vehicle through the neighborhood.

I observed the suspect exit his truck. I reported the location to Dispatch. I observed the suspect look at my cruiser and run away, hopping a chain link fence. I exited my vehicle and pursued the suspect heading north. I gave verbal commands to the suspect to stop and get on the ground.

I observed the suspect fall. He turned and face towards me and took a fighting stance. The suspect started running away again. I continued to give verbal commands for the suspect to stop and get on the ground.

I pulled my taser and told the suspect that I was going to tase him. He responded, "don't tase me." I repeated the instruction for the suspect to stop or he would be tased. He did not comply.

I believed that I, other officers, and community members were in imminent danger of bodily harm from the suspect and the only means of apprehension was the use of force. I did not believe that I could safely withdraw from the location and adequately protect myself, the other officers on the scene, or other possibly innocent persons in the area. I deployed my taser.

Both taser prongs struck the suspect. He immediately fell forward. I approached the suspect and instructed him to place his hand behind his back. The suspect did not immediately comply and I told him that I would tase him again if he did not comply. I reported to dispatch that I had deployed my taser.

I observed a plastic bag and cash in his hand. Based on my training and experience, I believed that the bag contained cocaine.

I continued to give commands to the suspect. He eventually complied and I was able to place his hands in cuffs behind his back. I saw blood pooling around the suspect's head and tried to roll the suspect on to his side and have him sit up. I observed more extensive injuries and requested that medics report to the scene.

Other officers arrived and took control of the suspect. The suspect was eventually carried to a car and transported for medical attention. I remained at the scene.

Later, I returned to headquarters. I turned over my body cam and taser to the lieutenant. The lieutenant downloaded the data and I kept the taser until BCI took custody. I also turned over the spent cartridge and taser prong to BCI."





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that he had one running. When he exited his cruiser, the subject turned and began

running north. He said that there was a Black female also getting out of the truck.
described that there was a house south of 522 Isabella with a chain-link fence. was traveling south, coming towards the truck. When the subject saw the officer, he took off running, hopped the chain-link fence, went into the yard, realized there was a six-foot privacy fence, doubled back, and began running north. He said that the subject got to the other end of the chain-link fence and hopped out of the fenced area.
said that when the male subject hopped over the fence, he fell on the ground. He said that he gave the male subject verbal commands to stay on the ground and get on the ground. He said that the male subject was able to pop up quickly, turned at him, had his hands up, and was looking at him. Said that he has been in several foot chases and believed that the subject was "looking to engage." He said that the subject began running again and was looking back at him, which he perceived was the subject looking to fight with him. Gave additional verbal commands, telling the subject to stop. Said that the subject was displaying active aggression as they went down an alley. Said that the subject. He said that he was going to use his taser because he didn't want to fight with the subject. He said that he was alone, and no other officers knew where he was at.
said that he drew his taser with his left hand and switched it over to his right hand. He said that he began giving the subject verbal commands to stop and stated that he was going to tase him. said that the subject said, "don't tase me." He said that the subject did not have any objects or weapons in his hands.
stated that his taser has two red dots that give an approximate area of where the probes could impact. He said that he was aiming towards the subject's middle back area and below. deployed his taser. He estimated that he was a little more than 10 feet away from the subject when he deployed his taser. described that the alley had a thick strip of grass in the middle with two tire tracks going down either side. He said that there did not appear to be much gravel on the tracks.
After the subject was tased, said that the taser was effective. He said that two probes hit the subject, causing neuromuscular incapacitation. He said that initially he did not see where the probes had hit the subject. He described that the subject locked up, completely stiff as a board with his hands down, and fell on his face, sliding as he fell.





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seconds. He said that he walked up next to the subject and could see the cycle finish and let off. asked the subject if he was done and told him to put his hands behind his back. He said that the subject was not putting his hands behind his back, and he told him he was going to get tased again if he didn't do so. dropped his knee onto the subject's butt and started to pull his hands back. When he grabbed one hand, he observed cash and a small bag of what he suspected of being cocaine. He said that he placed the items to the side and finished handcuffing the subject. He then observed blood pooling around the subject's face. laying on the chest, while handcuffed, following a run, is not an easy recovery position for breathing. Therefore, he rolled the subject onto his side and sat him up. He said that he observed blood pouring out of his face. called for a medic and other officers began arriving on scene. He said that Officer Kitchen was the first one who showed up. He said that Officer Kitchen was trying to keep the subject laying down because the subject tried to get up like he was going to run again. said that he had evidence in his hand, so he went to his cruiser to place the items in an evidence bag. walked back up to the subject, officers were requesting a medical bag. One officer asked for an ETA for medics and dispatch stated that they were coming from the 3000 block of East National, which is on the east side of the city. said that was at least 7-8 minutes away from their location. Since the subject was losing so much blood, officers decided to transport the subject said there was a past incident involving transporting people, so they felt it was necessary to ask supervision beforehand. An officer got on the radio and asked a supervisor, Sqt. Smith, if they could "load-andgo" with the subject. Sqt. Smith said it was up to Lt. Laramie. When Lt. Laramie didn't respond, Sqt. Smith said to do whatever they felt was necessary. Officers wrapped the subject's face and took the handcuffs off. Officer Warnock picked up the subject under his arms, and another officer grabbed his feet. The officers walked the subject over to the van and two officers rode in the back with the subject to Springfield Regional Medical Center. stated that he remained at the scene before he returned to headquarters. SA Frazier asked if removed any taser probes from the subject and he stated that he did. He said that while officers were uncuffing the subject, he observed a probe in the back of the subject's right arm. 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said that he removed that probe and was unsure who he eventually gave it to. He said that he was looking for the other probe and officers told him that it was in the back of the subject's head under the wrapped gauze. At headquarters, said that his taser was collected by Lt. Laramie and Officer Fleming. They downloaded the taser and returned it to him. He said that he was provided with a fresh cartridge, so he placed the new cartridge in his taser. He said that he was eventually photographed by BCI. SA Frazier asked if there were any other officers on scene when the taser use of force stated no. SA Frazier asked if there were any other incident occurred. people in the area. said that the light-skinned Black female was there, but he did not know where she had gone. described that the female stopped inside the fence, and he chased the male subject. He said that he told other officers that the female subject had run, but no one located her. said that when he went to his cruiser, there was a Black male with dreads standing on the sidewalk. He said that the male asked if he had got him. When he went down further to his car, said that there were also two White males, standing on the other side of the chain-link fence, who asked if he got him as well. He told them that he had got him. recalled trying the ask the Black male if he knew the subject and he would not identify him. learned who the subject was and stated he was not familiar with him. SA Seitzman asked if he had subjects run from him in the past. said that he has and stated that typically subjects flee because they have warrants, guns, drugs, or other criminal activity. He said that Springfield's a dangerous place and that he has been involved in a lot of different situations involving guns and people running. He said that not everybody flees and if they do, there's normally a reason. SA Seitzman asked if his level of suspicion rises when someone flees. stated that it does. He explained that during previous foot chases he has injured himself. said that he's had multiple prior incidents where he deployed his taser, being both effective and not effective. He said that he has never had an incident involving a taser where someone was seriously injured. that he has unintentionally hurt people during foot pursuits, where he tackled them, resulting in broken collar bones or dislocated arms. He described that he is a large with another 30-35 pounds of equipment. guy, said that when he arrested the subject, the charges he was





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investigating included felony failure to comply and multiple minor misdemeanor traffic violations, including stop sign violations and speeding. Additionally, he stated that the subject was facing obstructing official business, resisting arrest, and felony drug possession charges.

SA Seitzman asked about said that his goal was to put the top dot right in the center of the back or lower. He said that he was running and bouncing, with the subject also moving, making it difficult to acquire an exact position. He said that the taser has lasers, but they are difficult to see. He said he was aiming for his back when he fired the taser. SA Seitzman asked what the preferred area was to aim the taser. said that the preferred area is below the heart. He could not recall if there was any training regarding discharging a taser at a subject's back.
SA Seitzman asked if observed anything that made the area particularly dangerous. Stated no, describing that he observed more grass and believed it was a good spot to deploy the taser because it didn't seem like there was anything excessive or dangerous.
said that based on his department's policy, a subject must be actively resisting, to discharge a taser. He said that the resistance is based on the officer's perception. He described that per this policy; he is permitted to use a taser on a running subject when it's a felony crime of violence. Said that the subject was actively resisting because the subject was running from him in addition to turning towards him, looking back, and taking a fighting stance. SA Seitzman asked if he is authorized legally to use force on someone who's actively resisting, and stated yes.
SA Frazier asked if perceived any other options other than the use of force and he stated no. said that when he was chasing the subject, he initially thought he could run him down and take him to the ground. He said that when the subject started turning, it changed in his head, and he believed the subject wanted to fight. SA Frazier asked if he believed his actions were consistent with his training and stated yes.
SA Frazier asked to describe the subject's injuries. He said that the subject's face was covered in blood, and his eye was extremely swollen. SA Frazier asked if the subject made any statements after being tased. said that he told the subject to stop and sit down and he recalled the subject talking to him but could not recall what he said. said that the subject told him he was done. At that point the subject appeared to be conscious. When





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to his cruiser and came back, another officer had said that the subject was going in and out of consciousness. said that they were worried about the subject and his injuries.
stated that he watched the news regarding the incident and saw that people believed that police had beat the subject up. Therefore, stated that he went into the police department the day after the incident and had detectives take photographs of hands to document that he didn't have any injuries.
SA Seitzman asked what his desired effect was when he discharged the taser. stated that he was hoping that the subject would go down and he could arrest him, stating "almost exactly what happened besides the significant injury." said that he has never had somebody be injured from a taser, so using the taser was less of a use of force than a huge guy jumping on your back and taking you to the ground. He said that obviously it was different that day and he was not trying to hurt him.
After the incident, returned to his cruiser. He said that's when he realized that his BWC was not recording because it was stopped on a save setting from the original traffic related offense. He said that's when he activated his BWC by pressing the button. stated that their body-worn cameras have a lookback feature where you can extract two minutes of video even when the BWC was not activated or recording. Therefore, this feature was used to extract the video and that's why there is no sound regarding portions of the video.
<u>Video Recordings:</u>
Numerous body-worn camera (BWC) and cruiser video recordings were reviewed relative to this incident. The pictures below represent several still-shot photographs, which were taken from pertinent portions of the officer's BWC and cruiser video recordings. Not all BWC and cruiser videos were detailed below. It is suggested that the full reports be reviewed.
BWC Video:
It should be noted that was wearing a BWC but did not activate it until after the incident occurred. Springfield Police Department used a lookback feature, which is provided by Motorola, and can extract the video, even when the video was not activated. Therefore, some portions of the BWC video did not have audio.

• 11:30:00 hours - BWC video began.





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- 11:33:23 hours placed his laser down and put the car in drive.
 - 11:33:30 hours began driving.
- activated his in-car siren.
- 11:34:04 hours turned off his siren.
- 11:34:30 hours advised via radio to have dispatch create a traffic stop at Limestone and Perrin.
- 11:35:00 hours The sound on the video stopped. driving and talking on the radio several times.
- 11:38:20 hours got on the radio again, before exiting his patrol cruiser. A White male subject and Black female are seen running in front of 532 South Isabella Street.






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- 11:42:04 hours Officer Kitchen obtained a white towel and began trying to wipe the subject's face. The subject was heard gargling and having difficulty breathing.




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Civilian Witness Interview:

Tre'on Hutchins (Hutchins) was identified as being a civilian witness who was friends with the subject, had spoken to the subject via phone just prior to the incident, and was on scene after the incident occurred. Hutchins stated that he has known Foley for approximately two years. He said that they met through somebody else and became best friends. Hutchins said that Foley used to live with his parents but recently was living at different hotels.

On the day of the incident, Foley contacted Hutchins via phone. Hutchins explained that he was on the phone with Foley "when he had pulled over, when he had got away from the police." He said that Foley told him that he had got away and had parked his truck. Hutchins said that Foley told him to hurry up and get where he was, telling him that he had taken the cops on a high-speed chase. Hutchins said that Foley told him he was at Pleasant and Isabella.

Hutchins said that Foley was familiar with the Springfield area. Hutchins said that he lives right around the corner from there, at his mom's house. SA Frazier learned that Hutchins address is 1538 W Clark Street, Springfield, OH 45506. A google search revealed that Hutchins house was approximately 0.2 miles away from the incident location. Hutchins stated that he went to Pleasant and Isabella and observed Foley on the ground in the alleyway. He said that multiple officers were on scene and Foley was handcuffed. He said that police told him that Foley was okay, but that he wasn't waking up. Hutchins said that he saw that there was a lot of blood on the ground. He said that





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multiple officers were trying to help Foley, and he could hear Foley screaming, "help help God help." Hutchins said he saw the police load Foley into the paddy wagon, to take him to the hospital.

Hutchins stated that he did not observe the initial incident and was only present after the incident occurred. He was contacted by Foley's parents and told that Foley was deceased. Hutchins said that Foley's mom told him that the video is really how the officers say it went. Hutchins said that Foley had a couple different females and he doesn't know who he was with that day. Hutchins said that police told him that it was a Black woman. SA Frazier asked if he knew Tyvonda Jones and he stated that he did not.

Conclusion:

All known people who have relevant information regarding this investigation have been interviewed, and all known records have been obtained and reviewed. BCI has striven to conduct a thorough and impartial investigation into this OICI. BCI will continue to offer investigative assistance to any newly identified witnesses or information related to this criminal investigation. It appears that BCI's investigation into this OICI is concluded, unless such new information or witnesses are identified through the grand jury or other processes. As always, we remain available for consultation and look forward to your assessment of this investigation and your decision as to any additional efforts, processes, or further assistance or involvement you might determine to be necessary.
